Blackhawk Football Players Gather Honors

The 1999 edition of the Hinton Blackhawk football team recently wrapped up their season with a 4-3 District record to go along with a 4-5 overall record. Several Blackhawks have been named to special honor teams throughout the area.

The All-District team for Class 1A District #1 included no less than nine Blackhawks. Ben Jauer and Jon Weinrich were named to the first team as offensive linemen. Michael Kovarna (defensive line), Nathan Loutsch (defensive back), and Heath Hageman (linebacker) were all named to the first team defense. Mike Klemmensen (defensive end), Matt Meylor (center), Bryan Diediker (running back), and John Zevenbergen (defensive back) all garnered honorable mention status on the all district team.

The LeMars Daily Sentinel released its All-Plymouth County team recently. Seven Blackhawks were named to this honor team. Nathan Loutsch and Michael Kovarna were named to the first team defense at defensive back and defensive end respectively. Ben Jauer was

placed on the first team offense as an offensive lineman. Mike Klemmensen (tight end), Jon Weinrich (offensive lineman), Bryan Diediker (kicker), and Heath Hageman (linebacker) were named on the Sentinel's honorable mention list.

The Iowa daily newspapers of Iowa also name an All-State team. Three Blackhawks were named to the honorable mention squad. Nathan Loutsch, Michael Kovarna, and Ben Jauer were all listed to this elite team.

The Sioux City Journal compiles an All-Northwest Iowa squad. Two Blackhawks made this listing. Ben Jauer was named to the second team as an offensive tackle. Nathan Loutsch made the third team of this squad as a defensive back.

The Des Moines Register compiles its own All-State squad. This squad is divided according to the Iowa High School Athletic Association's classification system of which Hinton is Class 1A. The Blackhawks had two athletes named to the prestigious squad. Ben Jauer was named to the second team as an offensive lineman. Nathan Loutsch was named to the second team as a defensive back.

Building for the Future

Comprehensive School Improvement

Last month's article talked about recent Iowa Legislation as it relates to comprehensive school improvement. That article identified seven correlates of effective schools. These correlates are: clear school mission, safe and orderly environment, high expectations, instructional leadership, opportunity to learn and student time on task, frequent monitoring of student progress, home school relations. Let us take a look at the first three correlates listed.

The first correlate listed is the need to have a clear school mission. Schools are expected to instruct students in the basic skills and teach attitudes and behaviors associated with good citizenship. They are assessed by the degree to which students demonstrate knowledge and citizenship. A clear school mission is vital for an effective school. The mission statement is the driving force that keeps the school focused. The Hinton School District's Advisory Committee recently recommended a new mission statement to the board of education. The new mission statement reads: "A Community Dedicated To Developing Responsible Life Long Learners Prepared For Future Challenges." We as a school should continually refer to this mission statement as we establish instructional goals, set priorities, evaluate assessment procedures, and make day to day decisions that affect children. It would be our hope that each and everyone of our employees knows, understands, and is committed to our mission statement. As we continue with our comprehensive school improvement planning process, our mission statement will be our guiding principle.

The second correlate listed is the need to have a safe and orderly environment. Many people refer to this correlate as "climate" within a building. School climate is a combination of beliefs, values, and attitudes shared by students, teachers, administrators, parents, bus drivers, office personnel, custodians, cafeteria workers, and others that play an

important role in the life of a school. School climate includes the total atmosphere. It is that feeling one gets after spending an hour in a school talking with staff, walking the halls, popping into classrooms, and visiting other learning spaces. Some schools are warm to the touch; others are like ice. Students seem to know what the school personnel value by the way they are treated. Research has shown that school climate is the number one factor affecting student achievement.

Climate is generally broken down into two categories, physical facility and safeness. Commenting on the importance of physical facility, the late Ron Edmonds stated: "It isn't so much whether schools get windows broken; it's how long the windows stay broken. It isn't so much whether water fountains stop working, it's how long they don't work. Many school districts are very effective, even in older buildings. A floor that is clean and uncluttered, even though it has worn tiles, makes a statement every day to those who walk on its surface." The Hinton Community School will strive to provide a clean and inviting facility for students.

Safety of their children is parents number one concern when they send their children to school. Discipline within an effective school is applied consistently throughout the school. All staff members assume responsibility for maintaining order, regardless of whether the offender is assigned to them or not. Staff members make it clear what is and is not appropriate behavior. Students are

treated with respect and held accountable for their actions. Discipline with learning, not punishment, is the focus of the school. Effective schools have learned that it is the climate that makes people behave as they do. Establishing a positive, safe, and orderly school climate will result in positive student outcomes.

The third correlate relates to high expectations. In effective schools, there is the expectation that all children *can* learn, and the staff believes they *can* get all children to learn. Some staff members may have doubts that all children can learn. Whether or not teachers *believe* all children can learn is less important than that they *behave* as if all children can learn. The distinction is important. Teachers who consistently behave as

if all children can learn will eventually change their attitudes to be consistent with their behavior. With this behavior, teachers will conduct classrooms where all children have many opportunities to participate. Teachers will use questioning techniques, such as giving the question to the whole class before calling on someone, making sure every child gets a turn, waiting longer for a low-achieving student to respond, and using higher-order questions to stimulate thinking. When little is expected, often little is taught, and even less is learned. Properly administered high expectations are uplifting and empowering both to teachers and students.

As our staff examines, studies, and learns from the effective school correlates you can be assured that we will do everything possible to continually improve for the benefit of your children. For if we maintain the status quo in today's fast past environment, we are actually regressing. We as a district want to remain progressive and accountable for your child's achievement. We will do everything within our means to help your child experience success. Next month we will again examine several effective school correlates.

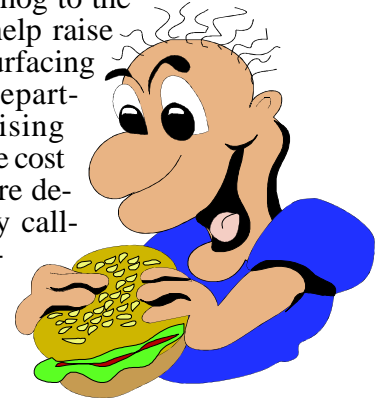

The annual screening is sponsored by the School District in cooperation with the Western Hills Area Education Agency's Early Childhood Department.
