## Advanced Placement English Language Goes High Tech

At the beginning of the year, students noticed a startling difference in their English class. The Advanced Placement English Language class that meets at 9:15 A.M. holds class over the ICN—Iowa Communications Network. This television network offers rural schools in the area to take classes that could not otherwise be offered in their smaller districts. Hinton is offering Advanced Placement English Language to River Valley, Maple Valley-Anthon-Oto, and Woodbury Central. In Hinton, 32 students are participating in this class.

A typical class for students involves teacher presentations and student participation like a normal class, but the teacher and the students have to use a microphone at their site to speak to the class. When speaking with their microphone, the camera zooms in on the speaker.

In addition to being slightly different in presentation style, the curriculum has been changed from the 2000 school year. The national A.P. English curriculum is being followed to prepare students for their freshman college composition course, or to take the A.P. English test in the spring. If students choose to take the exam and pass, they can possibly skip their freshman college composition course. Each college has different standards for A.P. test scores, so students are encouraged to check with their college before taking the test.

Our lunch program has been incorporating many changes this first quarter. Change is very difficult for many people to accept or understand. We have appreciated the feedback provided by our parents and students as we strive to provide a quality lunch program that is effective and efficient. A special thank you goes to our nutrition staff for all of their hard work and efforts. We will continually monitor our nutrition program to ensure we are providing a quality breakfast/lunch.

Have you noticed how nice our facility is looking on the inside? Our custodial staff has been restructured, which has proven to be beneficial. Our building is very clean and appealing on the inside. Our custodial staff is to be commended for a very fine job this first quarter. A clean and well-maintained facility helps to preserve a positive school climate.

The education profession is being challenged to improve student achievement. This is an outstanding challenge and one we gladly accept. Our teachers are to be congratulated for developing a good comprehensive school improvement plan. This plan addresses reading, math, and science achievement. Action plans have been developed and are being followed throughout the year to improve achievement in these areas. Our school improvement plan also addresses school climate by focusing on respect and character education.

Reflecting back on the first quarter we have many things to be proud of here in the Hinton Community School District. We can also be very proud of our parents and community. Our community really cares about our school and our students. Thank you for your great support!

Once again Hinton Community School will participate in the Southern Hills Mall's "School Cents" program. Twenty schools are participating in two separate contests for prizes totaling over \$25,000. Every dollar spent and redeemed in the mall during the program dates of October 1 to December 31 will count as one point for the chosen school. We will also be able to earn points for the publicity we generate to promote our participation in the contest. Publicity can include newspaper articles, various announcements at school events and yard signs to name a few. Points will also be gained by third quarter report card grades and perfect attendance. (Students will need to bring their report cards to the mall to redeem for points.)

Receipts from all mall stores, temporary tenants and surrounding stores (Pizza Hut, Hardees, KFC,



Long John Silvers, Amoco, Red Lobster, and Paper Warehouse) will count, as will Hy-Vee receipts. They again will be turned in at two locations in the mall and Point Pass Cards will be available at the Mall's Customer Service Center for those who wish to keep their receipts.

New for this year will be a revised point system for Hy-Vee receipts. To make it fair for districts outside of Sioux City, we will receive two points for each dollar spent, while Sioux City schools will only receive one. Other events include a Vocal Ensemble Contest on Satur-

day, November 11, which will not only gain us 1,000 points, but possibly a cash prize and an electric guitar and case valued at \$750. Radio station Star 102.3 will award \$1,023 to the school that calls in and gets the most points for answering their trivia questions, so we encourage students and

parents to listen during these three months. Finally, Pepsi is sponsoring a "Pepsi Notes" campaign that will help raise money to support the music departments of our schools. This is a separate contest, and there will be more information later.

This year, the money raised will be split between the speech/drama and music departments, H.S. drill team, and H.S. wrestling cheerleaders. For more information contact Mr. Terry Dahlquist at the school. We have raised over \$4,000 in past campaigns, and we hope, with your support, to do well again.



## Physical Plant and Equipment Levy Vote

At the October 16, 2000 school board meeting a resolution was passed to hold a physical plant and equipment levy (PPEL) vote on December 5, 2000. The additional PPEL funds will be used to maintain and improve schoolhouse facilities and equipment for the education program.

The current plan is to refurbish the high school science labs, junior high science lab, elementary restrooms, and computer labs. Other needs identified include updating the bus fleet, refurbishing additional restrooms, parking lot resurfacing, van replacement, industrial technology updating, classroom furniture,

roof maintenance, portable classrooms and baseball lights.

Currently our school has a regular PPEL, which generates 33 cents per \$1,000 of assessed valuation or \$43,347 for the current fiscal year. The issue on the ballot will generate an addition 67 cents per \$1,000 of assessed valuation or an additional \$88,061. The current plan is to procure a loan agreement with a financial institution allowing us to refurbish the identified rooms this coming summer. The additional PPEL funds generated by this levy will be used to repay this loan agreement. Any excess funds will be used to meet other facility and equipment needs.

Several open houses will be held in the near future. During these

open houses, community members will receive a tour of our facilities, additional information, and given the opportunity to ask questions relating to the PPEL fund.

It is the school board's goal to provide quality education for all of our students. Providing updated, quality facilities will help us contribute to a quality education for all. With your commitment, we will continually strive to reach our mission which states: A Community Dedicated To Developing Responsible Live Long Learners Prepared For Future Challenges. The approval of the physical plant and equipment levy will help us prepare our students for future challenges and demonstrate that we are a community dedi-

The Board of Directors of the Hinton Community School District met in regular session, Monday, September 18, 2000 in the board room. Members Howe, Held, Dittmer and Sohl responded "aye" to the roll call. Superintendent Steen, Principal Stuerman, Jo Jurgensmeier, Bruce Fey, Bruce Kramer and Chris Johnson were also present.

It was moved by Howe to approve the agenda. Second was by Sohl and the motion carried unanimously.

It was moved by Held to approve the minutes of the August 14, 2000 board meeting. Second was by Howe and the motion carried unanimously.

It was moved by Howe to approve the monthly Activity, Lunch, General and Schoolhouse Fund Financial Reports. Second was by Sohl and the motion carried unanimously.

A motion was made by Sohl to approve the list of bills, in the amount of \$165,803.89, for payment. Second was by Howe and the motion carried unanimously.

Copies of the official report of the school board election results were presented to the board. The results were as follows:
