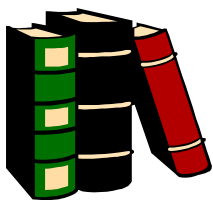

I know you have heard that the most important thing we can do for our children is to read to them. This is so true but what about when they get into junior high school and high school. Do we still read to them? The most obvious answer is yes!

During the weeks leading up to Thursday evening, the K-6 classrooms participated in various reading, writing, singing, and art activities relating to cowboys and the Old West. The fifth and sixth grade bands learned instrumental versions of cowboy themes, and the library stocked shelves with special interest books relating to horses, ranching, and the life of the cowboy.

On October 4th, thirty eight parents, staff, and community members set up and hosted rodeo "chutes", which featured a chuckwagon supper, horseshoeing demonstration, roping lessons, cowboy games (checkers, marbles, horseshoes), saddle making, and leather stamping. Also, Miss Holtgrew brought her roping horse, had line dancing, and a general store. Cheree Coffman serenaded the crowd with her "fiddle", and throughout the first part of the evening, each grade level performed at the "Readin' Revue" atop a hay wagon. They shared songs, stories, poetry, and danced to cowboy music. The fifth and sixth grade bands led the final half-hour program, which included a Sing-Along with Mrs. Deb Jordt and Mrs. Jane Kauzlarich, a campfire, and cowboy poet Mr. Don Losee from Sioux City. Mr. Losee sat in the firelight and recited poems and stories about the life of a cowboy. In closing, Mrs. Jordt led the audience in singing "Happy Trails to You."

First Grade Receives Donation

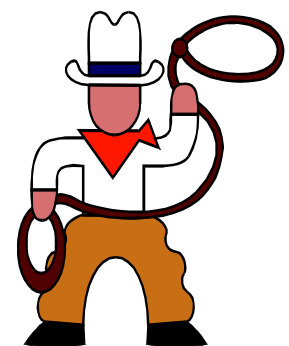

This program is safe, simple, quick, easy, profitable, guaranteed way of raising funds for our school. Empty inkjet printer cartridges can be collected from printers at home. Parents are encouraged to collect cartridges from their places of employment and from their co-workers. Cartridges should be brought to the elementary office for collection.

This program is based on the premise that we can earn funds for our school and help recycle at the same time. This gives the school the opportunity to take part in protecting our natural resources by cutting down on the amount of trash in landfills.

The school will be collecting cartridges throughout the school year. With your assistance this will be an extremely profitable way to raise money for the school and help our environment. Thank you for your support.

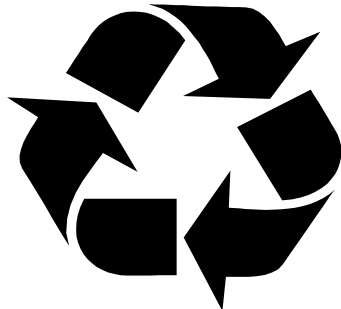

WHY SHOULD STUDENTS TAKE A FOREIGN LANGUAGE?

With the population of this country becoming so much more diversified, studying a foreign language is becoming increasingly important. Many students are realizing this when they get a job dealing with the public. So often students come to Spanish class and tell about an experience with Spanish that they had at work or shopping. Many of those times, they are excited about the fact that they were able to use their knowledge of the language. Learning a foreign language is a stepping-stone to world understanding.

Here at Hinton, Spanish is taught from seventh grade through twelfth grade. In seventh grade and eighth grade, the class is four and a half weeks long. They learn some vocabulary and put together some simple sentences.

Four years of Spanish is offered in high school as an elective. Emphasis is on vocabulary, speaking, listening, and culture. Many students take at least two years of Spanish, since some colleges require it. Iowa State now prefers three years. Some students continue for four years. A unique relationship develops among these students. Studying a foreign language can be fun, useful, and a necessity in the future.

The school board's priorities for 2002-2005 were officially approved at the October school board meeting.

Board Priorities 2002-2005

The School Board will understand the school improvement process for the Hinton School District. More specifically the board will:

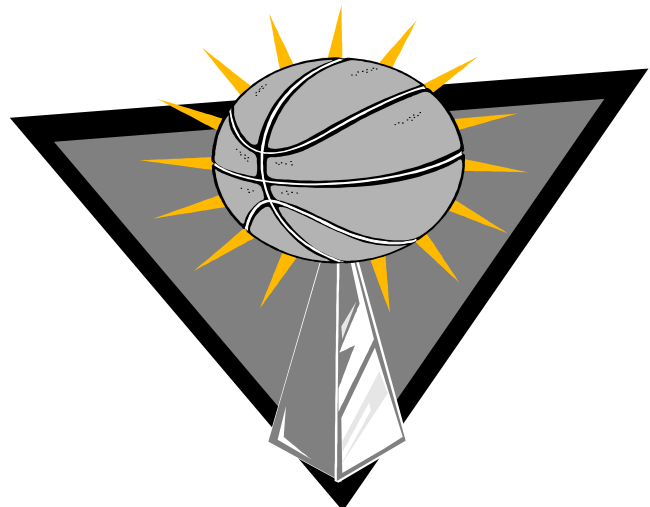
- Increase its knowledge regarding student achievement as it relates to standards, benchmarks, assessments, and progress reporting. This will be accomplished by:
 - Standards
Becoming aware of the student Learning Goals within our district.
 - Benchmarks
Becoming aware of the objectives for all children in fourth, eighth, and eleventh grades in the area of reading and math.
 - Assessments
Understanding how the district measures learning through the utilization of standardized testing such as, the ITBS and ITEDs.
Understanding how the district measures learning through the utilization of non-standardized assessment such as, the NWEA test or teacher made test.
 - Progress reporting
Evaluating what is the most effective way of presenting how our students are achieving to the community.
- The board will develop a long-range plan (3-5 years) for the district that will specifically address the facility needs for teaching and learning. This will be accomplished by:
 - Continually assess the current facilities to identify strengths and weaknesses.
 - Studying the long-term enrollment trends, financial considerations, economic development of the community, and any other pertinent information influencing the district.
 - Considering available information before determining the feasibility of new construction and/or remodeling of facilities within the district.
- The board will ensure long-term fiscal management and responsibility to constituents of the district. This will be accomplished by:
 - Understanding the basic processes utilized in building the budget.
 - Establishing a budget that supports the primary learnings for the district.
 - Continuing to be open and honest with the community regarding all district expenditures.
 - Exploring alternative funding sources for the district.
- The board will engage in ongoing board member development.
 - Assigning board members to committees as needed.
 - Continuing to encourage board members to attend educational workshops.

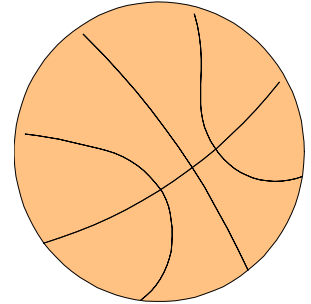

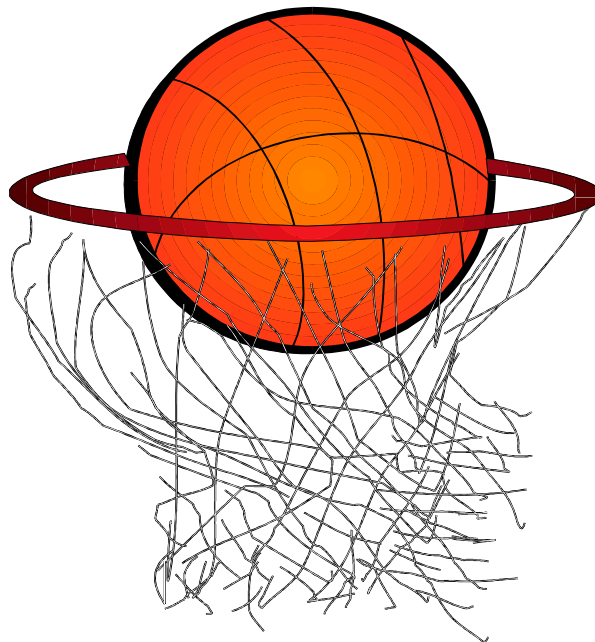


