# School Improvement Focuses on Respect

Students learn better, when they feel comfortable in their surroundings. Educators have known this for years. Being comfortable involves more than having a chair and desk that fit. It also has to do with how students are treated and how they treat others. A part of our School Improvement process involves the staff and administration in setting annual goals as we work toward a long-range goal to "maintain and improve the climate and culture of the Hinton Community School, ensuring a safe and orderly environment."

Last year, the K-6 program annual goal was to "reduce the incidents of disrespect and student conflicts as reported from May 2001 to May 2002." A ten-item questionnaire was given to all students in grade kindergarten through six each month, beginning in May 2001 and ending in May 2002. Throughout the school year, efforts were made to teach and enforce playground rules, hold discussions about respect and responsibility, teach assertive ways to deal with conflict, and develop a sense of empathy among students. Data collected at the end of the school year showed a 30 percent reduction in the number of reported incidents of disrespect and conflict. This year, the Blackhawk Code (Be Respectful. Be Responsible. Be Safe. Be Prepared.), will be taught as the foundation for an emphasis on character development throughout the curriculum.

Last year's annual improvement goal in grades 7-12 was to "reduce the incidence of disruptions from May 2001 to May 2002." Teachers had shared a concern that too many

students were missing valuable classroom or study time due to the use of hall passes. They also discussed the need for alternatives to the intercom for delivering messages around the building during class time. By the end of May 2002, data indicated that the email system had replaced the intercom for many messages and hall passes issued by teachers were down by 28 percent. The result is more time on task for students, and fewer disruptions to the learning environment. This year, monthly themes will address various aspects of character development, incorporating a character-building "word of the week" to be emphasized by adults and students.

The school improvement process will continue this year. New goals will be developed and action plans implemented, as we remain committed to a safe and orderly environment that facilitates high academic achievement for all students.

#### **Survey Results**




